Please Prepare for a Hot Dry Summer with Increased Fire Risk

- Check that your roof gutters are clear to enable as much water collection as possible.
- Gutters are a favourite place for airborne embers to start fires in a major wildfire.
- Check downpipes are clear and connected at roof and tank!
- Remove all dead vegetation from your section.
- Remove lower branches from larger trees to stop fires getting into the canopy.
- Keep all vegetation clear from all buildings.
- Store firewood and any flammables well away from buildings and definitely not under them.
- Make sure the village Evacuation Plan is prominently displayed. This is vital for those who rent their baches as guests do not know the area or the procedures. It's your responsibility to keep them safe.
- Have your own house escape plan as well.
- Check your smoke alarms, and that you have a secure ash bin.
- Note that the evacuation siren will rise to a pitch and stay there. A rise and fall siren is for Fire Brigade callouts.
- For a fire truck to reach your place access must be four metres wide with no overhanging branches.
- As the district dries out be aware of the increased spark danger from machinery.

There will be working parties on the **GreenBreak** in Lodge Rd on **Saturday 13th and Saturday 20th of January.** Both in the morning 9am to 12 noon.

This is an opportunity for property owners to help protect their village from fire, gain an understanding of the district's vulnerability to fire, and see how to apply these prevention techniques to their own place.

Rotoiti FireSmart January 2024

Dear Rotoiti Residents,

This is a good time for us to contact property owners who may be here on holiday. Please read the following carefully and ask questions and express any concerns. What happens from now on regarding the fire safety of the village will depend on a community with a united response.

The Rotoiti FireSmart Working Group was formed in 2019 as a partnership between the Rotoiti District Community Council (RDCC) and the Department of Conservation (DOC) to establish a GreenBreak along Lodge Rd, and promote fire safety in and around the village. The GreenBreak is well advanced (go and have a look!) and in addition to slowing a large fire, it has been a very useful educational tool for property owners. If this work is possible in a National Park, then equally you have permission to fire-smart your own place.

A good number of residents have done excellent work making their properties safer which means their neighbours also benefit.

A common misconception is that permission from DOC is required to remove flammable material and vegetation at private residences. Not so. The Tasman District Council (TDC) is the relevant authority, but they are well aware of our extreme exposure to the wildfire risk. TDC have made grants available to the RDCC for our ongoing FireSmart work for four years running. An additional agreement with TDC allows the RDCC and its FireSmart Group to clear road reserves as they and local nearby residents see fit. This collaborative approach allows roadsides to be cleared of highly flammable kānuka/mānuka and replanted with low flammability native broadleaves (or similar).

Ward Street has been a successful step in the process as all residents either work for DOC or the Rotoiti Lodge and are well aware of the potential fire danger. Prior to clearing and replanting, it was unlikely a fire truck would have entered Ward Street in a vegetation fire as it was too overgrown. If your street is too overgrown then the same situation will apply to you.

The TDC road reserves still exist as originally planned in the early subdivision of St Arnaud. The remainder of the land has reverted to Conservation Land. Some of these road reserves could be cleared and replanted and in conjunction with the clearance of the old firebreak to the northwest of the village, could provide a realistic degree of wildfire protection. You can see from the accompanying photo with the GreenBreak marked up Lodge Rd that a Summit St to Ward St break on road Reserve and old firebreak (in the National Park) would give very good secondary protection to many houses in that area. Most of the fire risk reduction work over the last four years has been carried out by a small group of volunteers, fire brigade members and DOC staff. We understand not everyone can help but we do need your permission as property owners to continue with this next large step. We can't proceed without it. Crossing fingers and topping up the insurance will not prevent another Lake Ohau fire and having seen that devastation a few weeks after the fire, prevention looks very attactive!

Have your say on speed

The way speed limits are set has changed. Speed limits are now set through a Speed Management Plan.

A Speed Management Plan sets the direction for 10 years with an implementation plan reviewed every three years. The Nelson Tasman Regional Transport Committee is consulting on a draft Speed Management Plan to come into force in 2024.

This is your opportunity to influence road safety with input into the appropriate speeds on the whole transport system across Nelson and Tasman.
