BLACK VALLEY SWAMP AND NEW CULVERTS

We are all very familiar with the roadworks happening east of the village. We got involved in making sure the two culvert-widening operations did not impact on the Black Valley wetland. This is the big wetland to the north of SH63 as we leave the village heading east – it is part of Big Bush Conservation Area. The main effect of the culvert work for the wetland was the lowering of the St Arnaud stream bed by 1.5m. Over the years gravels had built up inside the culvert as the stream is a very gravelly one, and naturally accumulates a gravel fan.

The gravel fan extends quite a long way into the wetland and is not wet. So having the channel dug in deeper has not affected the wetland but the channel-straightening could lead to faster, more direct flow of floodwater in to the main Black Valley stream. Before the diggers finished up at the culverts we asked for a high-water deviation channel to be formed through a low point in the gravel fan to help take some of the water at high flows into the wetland rather than straight into the stream. The wet areas of the wetland are a good opportunity to soak up some floodwater and hopefully help temper flood events. This takes us closer to the braided-gravels-channel that we had before the culvert work. We will watch the next storm event with interest, and fingers crossed as always.
