The kākahi/freshwater mussels/ *Echyridella menziesii* in lakes Rotoiti and Rotoroa were the subject of an intensive monitoring effort by a top-of-the-south team led by Janet Newell last month.

In an effort that is almost unimaginable now, given the turn the weather has taken, a DOC dive team spent a day in each lake (harmlessly) digging small plots on underwater transects, to yield baseline data on the kākahi populations.

There's interesting reading about kākahi at this <u>NIWA site</u>. Their life cycle is pretty amazing and an illustration of the interconnectedness of our native freshwater systems. Kākahi are a threatened species, and their continued health depends on clear water, limited sedimentation, and healthy populations of the native fish that move them around.

The invasion of the *Lindavia* diatom is the motivation behind this work. If lake snow blooms become the norm for our lakes, as they have for Lake Wanaka and others, then there might be impacts on the life of the lakebeds. We realised that we don't understand the population structure or distribution of kākahi in our lakes, apart from that they are there. So this monitoring gives us a baseline to measure against in the future, as well as improving our understanding of this threatened species Findings:

- kākahi distribution is quite patchy in both lakes, with more being found at shallow sites (<10m) than deep sites (>10m)
- the size ranged from 8mm to 88mm, and on average they were 50-60mm long
- there seem to be very few small kākahi in Rotoiti compared to Rotoroa (consideration is going into the potential reasons for this, and whether it is cause for concern)

Updating the pet cat census

The Friends of Rotoiti and DOC together keep a census of pet cats throughout the Rotoiti area, which is carried as a booklet by everyone who is active in trapping cats.

This is kept as up to date as possible, and we are all especially keen to have information on new pet cats.

The staff and FOR volunteers that are doing the work are always concerned about the possibility of accidentally despatching a cat that is someone's pet. Please note that all cat trapping is done with live-capture cage traps, and one of the reasons for choosing this method is so pets can be returned home unharmed.

In addition to updating the census booklet, it is really helpful if pet cats are prevented from wandering, and also wearing a collar.

Please be in touch if you have an update for the pet cat census. Also, if you are aware of neighbours or bach owners who bring cats on holiday that might not know about the cat census or this newsletter, can you mention it to them?

<u>Tasman District Council Grants to the Rotoiti</u> <u>District Community Council</u>

The RDCC was fortunate to receive two Community Grants from Rates in the last financial year.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the TDC for these grants as they have enabled work in the village which could not have been otherwise completed.

One grants was for \$2,000 which, when added to the \$5,000 raised in the community, enabled the installation of 6 security cameras in the village. Only the NZ Police have access to this footage but I have been advised the number plate recognition technology has been used multiple times. This information is not used to check vehicle Registration or WOF status.

The other TDC grant was for \$3,000 which has enabled the planting (with help from DOC - thank you Janet) of some 450 low-

flammability *Griselinia littoralis* trees in the Green Break along Lodge Road. These trees are also protected by environmentally friendly protectors. Further work with the community chipper has removed high flammability mānuka/kānuka from Ward Street (with lots more to go).

We also won a National Kia Tika Award (Doing the Right Thing) from Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) for the work we have done as a community and Volunteer Fire Brigade to protect our village from fire risk. Last November when Wattie Mortimer and myself accepted the award in Christchurch from FENZ CEO Rhys Jones on behalf of the Fire Brigade and the wider community, we acknowledged the assistance we had received from TDC.
