Dark Sky Park Proposal for St Arnaud

Ralph Bradley from the Top of the South Dark Sky Committee attended the last RDCC meeting to gain support to turn the village into a designated Dark Sky Park.

Ralph indicated that we have a relatively uncontaminated night sky and would be likely to meet the criteria set by the International Dark Sky Committee. Once designated, it would then be a matter of looking after what we've got, which would be via education for residents on how to minimise outdoor light spill, and other initiatives such as using narrow spectrum amber LED's in our street lighting as and when replacement is necessary. (RDCC lobbied during the hillside subdivision to get low level bollards installed as opposed to the 6m monsters that the Engineering standards required, a battle we eventually won, to protect our night sky). The RDCC resolved unanimously to support St Arnaud becoming a Dark Sky Park subject to consultation with residents and ratepayers. Accordingly, RDCC are calling for feedback on the proposal and request that any submissions be emailed to the Secretary at jbandsjh@gmail.com no later than 23rd October 2018.

RDCC Officer vacancies

Doug McConochie (Chairperson) & Brent Higgins (Secretary) have been fulfilling these roles for many years, but have given notice that they won't be seeking reelection at the next AGM, coming up in November this year.

The positions are held for 3 years and both are paid an annual honorarium \$400 (chair) and \$700 (secretary). We are looking for suitable replacements to ensure continuity and that RDCC continues to be an effective lobby group for the district.

What happened over July and August 2018?

July and August were very wet months. Fine breaks in the weather were used for field work, finishing reports and completing tasks in the workshop. Look out for the 2017/18 RNRP annual report, due in September.

Mustelids

Stoat catches are very low, we scaled back to 2 monthly trap checks and in August only seven stoats were caught. The main body of work for the last few months has been working to upgrade our mustelid trap network in the RNRP. All trap boxes in the RNRP will be replaced with larger trap boxes fitted with two DOC200 traps. These will then be used to run a trial comparing double set DOC200s in a best practise box design to those in a run-through style box.

This trial builds on work being done by the Friends of Rotoiti in the Rainbow Valley comparing run-through traps to standard traps.

One of the main functions of the RNRP is as a research site, and this type of research helps inform better conservation practice.

Possums

Possum captures have remained at a low level with only two caught in August. We are continuing our clay-based lure trial in Big Bush, and it appears that the dough clips might be more attractive than the clay.

Kea Nest Protection

The kea nest protection work for the breeding season has started with traps around known kea nesting sites being set. Kea nest on the ground in cavities so eggs and chicks are vulnerable to predation. Kea will reuse nest cavities each year. Mustelid and possum traps have been installed around nests in an effort to protect them during breeding.



Kea in her nest with chick and egg © DOC Corey Mosen This is difficult work as kea seem to like nesting in the steepest areas, with bluffs making it difficult to set out good networks around all nests. Trail cameras have been installed in nest cavities to monitor for kea.

Avalanche monitoring

DOC is working with Rainbow Skifield staff to monitor avalanche risk and activity in the National Park and around the skifield.

Currently Hopeless Hut is <u>closed</u> to the public due to the severe avalanche risk.

D'Urville Hut

The once dark D'Urville Hut had a 'make-over' by the Visitor Assets Team. The bench bunks were replaced, a new floor installed, and vegetation trimmed to make the most of the spectacular views. The hut is now bright and airy. Access to D'Urville Hut is by foot from the Sabine or D'Urville valleys, or by boat.
