## DOUBLE-SET TRAP DEPLOYMENT

Part of the summer's workload for the biodiversity team was replacing all 849 traps in our Rotoiti stoat trapping network, with new trapboxes. The existing trap boxes were getting worn out and it was time to replace the entire network and upgrade to the current best-practice which is two traps mounted in one box.

As with all of the landscape-scale biodiversity protection work that we do, this trap changeover is being conducted as an experimental trial that will contribute to DOC bestpractice. Using funding from the Tiakina Nga Manu (Battle for Our Birds) programme, we will compare the efficacy of the current DOC best-practice double-set trap box with a 'run-through' design; the two designs alternating along every trap line. Friends of Rotoiti ran a small pilot trial on their Rainbow line which showed potential for the runthrough design to catch more mustelids. The current trial will show if this is the case over a wider landscape, using double-sets.

All trap boxes are designed to guide the target animals over a trap (in this case, the DOC200), while excluding non-target animals. For us the most important non-targets are kiwi, kea and weka. The DOC best-practice boxes involve two mesh baffles at each end with carefully-sized offset holes, so a weka or kiwi can't get a beak into a trap. The run-through box design works on the principle that it may be more attractive to stoats to be able to see a way through the box in a straight line. The ends are protected by a much less visual mesh, and the distance to the traps is theoretically too long for a bird to reach in. The traps are aligned the same way and there are ramps to guide the animal up and in for a humane kill. Huge piles of boxes were delivered partly assembled, and the remaining assembly work was completed in our workshop during spring.

The double-set boxes are heavier, longer, and take more work to 'bed in' than the old single-set traps. They are attached to the ground, and the traps inside are carefully calibrated so that they will catch an animal in a certain weight range without accidentally setting off the other trap in the box. So, the work for us to deliver these traps to the network was physically hard and also quite exacting. Even with the help of helicopter drops at strategic points, it required a big team effort, usually in groups of 6 or 8. We've been sending our monthly volunteers away stronger and fitter than they have ever been before (this equals not-quite-broken!).

Even though it's now double-trouble for the stoats out there we are expecting the trap network to be overwhelmed by huge numbers of rats (over this autumn and winter) and stoats (in springtime) in response to the current fall of beech seed. This will provide lots of great data for comparing the trap boxes but we are not looking forward to seeing the effects of high rodent and mustelid densities on our wildlife. Watch this space for more about that.

Thanks to the volunteers that have worked the hard yards alongside us both in the workshop and on the hills during this long, hot summer. Thanks also to Phil and Fiona Borlase who last year kindly let us fly fadges of traps from their paddock.

# Restricted Fire Season

Fire and Emergency New Zealand declares a restricted fire season, effective from 08:00am, 21 March 2019 in the following area(s):

• All of the fire zones 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8,9,10 of the Nelson/ Tasman Fire District. In general this covers all of the Nelson City and Tasman District Council areas.

A permit is required to light a fire in open air in these areas.

See **www.checkitsalright.nz** for types of fire which have been authorised as not being fires in open air and do not need a permit.

Any fire permits issued during a restricted fire season are suspended if Fire and Emergency declares a prohibited fire season, or prohibits fire in open air, in the area(s).

# **Farmers Assist**

The New Zealand Deerstalkers' Association (NZDA) has launched its 'NZDA Farmer Assist' program throughout New Zealand. This program has been developed to provide farmers and landholders with a simple way of finding qualified NZDA members to undertake shooting as part of pest control activities. This service is provided at no cost.

The program has a unique online portal that acts like an introductory service. Farmers and landholders simply register and then use the program's job board to seek assistance to deal with problem wildlife on their properties. Once the request has been added to the jobs board, only registered members approved for the program can respond to the request. Farmers then simply choose which member/s they want to contact after viewing submitted applications.

For extra peace of mind, all NZDA members participating in the NZDA Farmer Assist Program are covered by the Association's \$10m public liability insurance policy. Members involved in the program have committed to a strict code of practice that incorporates safety, animal welfare and ethical shooting.

Members must undertake an assessment to display a professional-like shooting standard.




