

# Avalanche Forecasting Improvement for Nelson Lakes

Mountain Safety Council recently installed a public remote camera trained over the Angelus basin and Rotomaninitua / Lake Angelus, to supply real time imagery for the purposes of improving the public avalanche forecasting for Nelson Lakes, via the NZ Avalanche Advisory (NZAA). Additionally, it is expected that the camera will provide significant benefits for tramper and climber safety, by improving the information available for people to plan. The camera is on a 12 month trial to assess the technical viability of the installation.

The imagery will be added to the DOC website in a short time but meanwhile, you can view images at Mountain Safety Council New Zealand — Mountain Cameras msc.imagegallery.co

The camera loads a new image to this site, every half hour.



# COMMUNITY NOTICE DOC COMMUNITY

NOTICE for Police National SAREX 2023 The New Zealand Defence Force and New Zealand Police are carrying out a search and rescue training exercise involving helicopters, vehicles and personnel in the Raglan and Rainbow Conservation area, Tapuae-O-Uenuku Scenic Reserve, Inland Kaikoura Ranges and Mt Richmond Forest Park area over the period 08 – 12 May 2023. In order for the New Zealand Defence Force and New Zealand Police to maintain their readiness to deploy, this type of training needs to be undertaken in a variety of environments. Being able to exercise in diverse environments ensures personnel are highly trained and able to support domestic, regional and global situations. We appreciate the support our local communities extend to our personnel when we conduct these training activities outside of our normal training areas.







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# **How East Bay became Kerr Bay**

In 1967 local man Don Cummings wrote a letter to the Parks Board in support of a proposal to change the name of East Bay to John Kerr Bay. Following are excerpts from his letter that shed some light on how Kerr, a Scottish immigrant, earned a place on our maps and in our local history. "John Kerr, Pioneer, Explorer, Farmer, Conservationist, Member of Parliament and one of Nelson Province's great men... arrived in Nelson in the ship Fifeshire in 1842.

"In his early years he spent considerable time exploring the back country [searching] for an easy route between Nelson and Marlborough. "He took up large holdings in Marlborough and Lake Roto-iti, later selling his holdings in Marlborough ... and built a spacious Homestead on the Buller Plains. He named these holdings Lake Station.

"Mr Kerr was quick to realise the great potential of Lake Roto-iti and the surrounding mountains as a recreational area of par excellence ... and spared no effort or expense in his enthusiasm to establish wildlife and fish in the area. "On the 6 th of July 1882 Mr John Kerr released 200 brown trout fingerlings in the Black Valley Stream ... and ecame the first man to establish trout at Lake Roto- iti. He made a further liberation of 1000 brown trout fingerlings on the 16 th November 1883.

"On the 19 th February 1884 Mr John Kerr was appointed a Ranger of the Nelson Acclimatisation Society and thus became the first Ranger at Lake Roto-iti. "Blechynden Cottage was built by John Kerr and, along with Mr Kerr's boatshed built on the foreshore immediately in front, [were] the first buildings erected at Lake Roto-iti.

"Mr Kerr's boat was the first [European] boat on Lake Roto-iti. "In 1885 Mr John Kerr was elected to the House of Representatives. While in Parliament he was responsible for the erection of the first bridge over the Buller River." These (slightly edited) notes from writings by great-grandson Bill Butters offer some details about John Kerr's other achievements:

"In 1882 John Kerr travelled to the USA where he made exhaustive enquiries on behalf of the Acclimatisation Society regarding various species of freshwater fish, game birds and animals (which were imported in following few years). As well he purchased a large quantity of merchandise. So numerous were his acquisitions, he chartered a ship for his return voyage. Significant among his cargo were a number of draught horses and thoroughbred American trotting horses to be used for breeding (these, along with further imports of trotters from Australia, were to earn John Kerr a place of high regard in the history of NZ trotting). Also among this shipment were Mountain Quail and all kinds of equipment little known in NZ at the time, including the first covered wagons, racing sulkies, doctors' carriages, various kinds of harness, farm implements, washing machines, glassware, and six organs and other musical instruments".

By all accounts, John Kerr was a big man (reportedly 20 stone/127kg) with big ideas. He has been variously described as colourful, pig-headed, innovative, no-nonsense, a man of vision. At the time of his death 125 years ago — on May 3 rd 1898 — he was 68. His upturned boat was found 50 feet (15m) from shore, his body nearby in 8-9 feet (2.5m) of water. He'd gone out to check on a net he'd set to see if his liberations of White Fish had been successful (they've not been seen at the Lake since). Death by accidental drowning was the verdict. Don Cummings concluded his letter to the Parks Board (which decided on the abbreviated name of Kerr Bay):

"So ended the life chapter of a great man who had figured in so many firsts and, by his untimely death, became the first and only known European to lose his life in Lake Roto-iti." Ends.

# Weed Alert - Yellow Bristle Grass (Setaria pumila)

Yellow bristle grass (YBG) is an unwanted grass that has established close to the Nelson Lakes area. Although palatable to stock during spring, cattle will not graze YBG once it starts forming a seed head, (January – May). The loss of grass production on dairy farms in the North Island due to the presence of YBG has been estimated at around 20%.

There are no suitable insect vectors that could be considered for introduction to control YBG, although some research in to pathogens is underway.

The bristly seed head of YBG attaches readily to the hair of animals and can be moved between farms in feed such as hay. Roadside mowing is another seed movement pathway for YBG. This is very difficult to manage effectively, as it is not practicable to waterblast mower components between all the various roadside YBG sites. YBG growing on the road verge can quickly spread to adjacent farmland, so being aware of the risk and identifying and controlling the grass when it is first noticed is important to prevent its establishment in pastureland.

YBG is now so widespread along road verges in Tasman that it is only controlled in areas where it is likely to spread to dairy farms, such as Golden Bay and the Murchison / Nelson Lakes area.

Herbicide spraying at the correct times of the year is the best option for control, and is carried out by TDC Biosecurity officers. There is one site at Kikiwa and several between Kerr's Hill and the Golden Downs forestry camp which are monitored and controlled by the TDC.

# UPPER WAIRAU WAIRAU WAIHOPAI TMA Possum Control – Poison Warning

Excell Biosecurity wishes to advise that a ground-based possum control operation will be taking place to keep possum numbers under control to prevent spread of TB. This operation will be conducted as part of the TBfree New Zealand programme.

**Areas covered:** The operation covers an area of 8,753 hectares along the Wairau River between the Rainbow Road and Badmans Flat.

Operation date: 20 March to 30 June 2023.

Poisoning methods: Feratox is a small capsule containing cyanide poison (about the size of a pea). In bait bags the cyanide capsule has been placed into a non-toxic peanut paste inside a small blue biodegradable bag. The blue bags will be attached to trees and suitable habitat. On occasion bait stations will also be used.

Traps will also be used throughout the area in conjunction with poisoning methods. The public is warned to take care in these areas and not to remove carcasses or baits. Baits are dangerous to people and dogs.

# **General warning**

- Do not touch poison baits / traps
- Do not touch poisoned possum carcasses
- Keep pets under supervision
- · Do not leave children unattended
- Follow the advice on the poison warning signs
